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

A LEWENTHAL LISZT CYCLE MONDAYS MARCH 1 and 15, 4-6 p.m.

"Not within the memory of most men has such a feat been accomplished,"

Times senior critic Harold C. Schonberg declared when pianist Raymond

Lewenthal brought his marathon Liszt triptych to New York a decade ago.

"One would have to go back to Busoni to find anything like it."

A year later Lewenthal was invited to display his three-part Liszt Cycle in

London, a city with a long and noble Liszt tradition dating back to Liszt's own

day and coming right up to the present. Lewenthal authentically comes by his

authority in the romantics. His first teachers Lydia Cherkassky, the mother of

Busoni; and Alfred Cortot was Lewenthal's last teacher.

Tapes from these performances in New York and London are being heard in New York on BAI to offer a new generation an awareness of the many aspects of Liszt's music. In addition, Lewenthal is offering live comments about Liszt, the man. These programs, three of them, are co-produced by writer-impressario Peter Dvarackas and BAI broadcaster James Irsay and

began Feb. 23 and continue March 1st and 15th from 4 to 6 p.m.

While a "live" Liszt cycle for '76 may be in the offing, Lewenthal is currently including works by Liszt in his Romantic Revival Ensemble Series which will have its concluding concert Wednesday, March 3 at 8 p.m.

Here is a roadmap to the remaining programs of the BAI cycle: March 1st at 4 p.m.: Premiere Annee de Pelerinage. Suisse; Csordas macabre; Ballade No. 2 in B minor; Waldesrauchen; Mephisto Woltzes No. 1 and 3; Praeludium on Bach's Weinen, Klagen.

March 15th at 4 p.m.: Troisieme Annee de Pelerinoge Italie; Hexomeron; Sospiri; Weihnochtsbaum; Klavierstuck; Transcendental Etudes 6 and 10.

Liszt was a many-splendored man. He was one of the most astonishingly multifarious artists in the whole history of music: the greatest pianist of all time — who created both a whole new technique and a vast new repertoire for the instrument; a conductor who presented the first performances of many of the most significant works of his day; a teacher who taught most of the greatest pianists of the 19th century; chief champion of his son-in-law Wagner as well as of Berlioz, Schumann and most of the other important

composers of the era; writer, editor, abbe and Don Juan, aristocrat and republican, demon and saint, courtier and gypsy, Faust and Mephisto... one of the most prolific and prophetic of all composers, one who summed up most of what had gone before him and predicted much of what was to come after. The life force, the vitality, energy, enthusiasm, patience, willingness to work, imagination of the man were staggering. There has never been anything like him and probably never



will be. The breadth and variety of styles in his music from one period of his life to another and within each period is breathtaking. It is possible only by means of a cycle of this sort to give a view of the myriad aspects of Liszt, by juxtaposing and contrasting Liszt's styles and periods in their many ramifications and permutations.

The three books of Annees de

The three books of Annees de pelerinage (Years of Wandering) span most of Liszt's artistic life. The first two, Italie and Suisse, were written in his twenties when he

travelled about in those countries with the Comtesse d'Agoult. They were revised in his middle years when he lived in Weimar with the Princess Wittgenstein. And the third book comes from his late years when he lived in Rome as the benign Abbe Liszt. These three volumes contain some of Liszt's most exquisite and evocative music and just as they were a thread running through his life, so do they form the connecting link between the three concerts of this cycle, one volume appearing on each program . . . It is hardly possible to imagine that the same man wrote these three volumes nor does it seem credible that the same man wrote these three volumes nor stark, Bartokian Csardas macabre and the tender Wiegenlied, the wild Third Mephisto Woltz and the winged, Richard Strauss-like F Sharp Klavierstuck, and the grandiose, superb Norma Fontasy. Very little time elapsed between the cool clear air of the Swiss Annee and the glittery glare and over-charged. crystal chandeliered atmosphere of the salon of Principessa Belgioioso, where the famous ivory duel between Liszt and his temporary rival Thalberg occurred as part of the entertainment at a charity concert for the Italian poor - at which time the fascinating Hexomeron, with its variations by Chopin, Czerny. Herz and Pixis was also to have seen the light of day (or rather of a thousand candles) Yes, this cycle covers many of the aspects of Liszt, from the poetic, virtuosic young years to the gloomy, grandly sad last years, when the demon in this extraordinary man could still suddenly rise up and Raymond Lewenthal

''Make My People Live'' Black Elk

European invaders set foot on this continent, en masse, in the 16th Century and native people faced alien beings who sought to possess sacred Mother Earth. The struggle began—the resistance began.

Each succeeding wave of conquerors wrote a new scene in the tragedy Attempts were continually made to subjugate, contain, reform, assimilate, divide, remove and exterminate native people

When the white man began to colonize "The New World," there were about 10 million native people here. By the late 1800s, there were approximately 250,000 left. There had been many, many diverse cultures in this Northern. Hemisphere. Yet the people were only recognized as "Indians"—Columbus was, after all, on his way to India. The Native American's doom was sealed. Those unknown persons—misnamed, misunderstood and mistreated—were cast in a drama not of their making and forced to act out a role not of their choosing.

To insure that we may gullibly accept the historic fallacy that our predecessors came here to create a "free" nation, history books, in conjunction with the makers of "filmic history," have conveniently omitted telling us about the many indigenous nations exterminated on God's behalf and in the name of freedom

Now, in 1976, the descendants of the conquerors who inhabit what is now called the United States of America are celebrating 200 years of freedom from

another European oppressor. And they do so while continuing to oppress native people who do not wish to play "Indian" anymore, who do not want to give up their small remaining portions of land for stripmining, for the exploitation of shale, oil, coal and other minerals which the white man demands, who wish to go back to their traditional ways, who wish for Mother Earth to live again.

One hundred years ago, while America was celebrating its centennial, the Dakota (Sioux), with their allies, the Cheyenne and Arapaho, met and defeated Custer's command at the Greasy Grass (Little Big Horn). For the next fourteen years, until the massacre of hundreds of men, women and children at Wounded Knee, December 29, 1890, the fight for survival by the Dakota might be charactarized as the crystalization of all Native American resistance. And Black Elk born in 1863, the great spiritual leader of the Oglala Dakota, lived through it all—from tipi to pre-fab house, from buffalo hunt to supermarket, from horseback to airplane.

In 1931 Black Elk recounted his life-story and his visions to John G. Neihardt in his book *Black Elk Speoks*. In 1947, three years before his death, Black Elk gave an account of Seven Rites of the Oglala to Joseph Epes Brown which are recorded in the book *The Sacred Pipe*.

In this bicentennial year of 1976, to those Native American leaders facing trials and jail terms throughout the country, to those native people continuing the fight for sovereignty throughout the land, the continuing reading by native Americans on WBA1 beginning Friday, March 19, at 11 P.M., of Block Elk Speaks, The Socred Pipe; and, starting in the fall, Crozy Horse, Strange Man of the Oglalas, by Mari Sandoz, is respectfully addicated.

The personality of Johann Sebastian Bach is, by and large, profoundly misunderstood by laymen and scholars alike. He is too often seen as a formal, somewhat stodgy, and, on the whole, humorless man preoccupied with intricate counterpoint and the composition of music for religious texts that often seem morbid, if not downright grizzly, to the twentieth century

Bach was not and is not some sort of distant, inaccessible alchemist to be respected and revered but not to be known intimately or at close quarters. The letters and other documents which survive make it plain that Sebastian Bach was human, like the rest of us. He had a tendency to be impatient, and he resented and rebelled against interference and injustice. He was a tenacious, dogged, and highly principled man, with a sense of humor and a lively, often cutting wit. He was a connoisseur of good wines, he dabbled in numerology, and he built a fine, small library of rare theological books. He was an expert on the design and construction of musical instruments, and, in his time, may very well have been Europe's foremost authority on acoustics. In sum, Johann Sebastian Bach was a multi-faceted and eminently approachable individual.

Bach has been the victim of changing attitudes towards both art and religion. These attitudes were already in a state of flux during his lifetime. While Bach's contemporaries respected his talents as a virtuoso and his consummate musical craftsmanship, quite a few found his compositions dated and out of style. Paradoxically, however, once Bach's music was rescued from the almost universal neglect it suffered during the second half of the eighteenth century, it has successfully weathered all the storms of changing attitudes and tastes.

There has been a growing trend in recent years to emphasize the need for "authentic performance" of Bach's music. As praiseworthy and as important as the desire to present Bach's music as he heard it is, the preoccupation with authentic performance practice has had the unfortunate side effect of throwing the baby out with the bath water. The virtues of the numerous, fine "unauthentic" performances which have made their way onto recordings should neither be denied nor overlooked. Interpretations that are emotionally direct, spiritually compelling, inherently sensitive, and in good taste should not be cast aside because a piano is used instead of a harpsichord, because the organ was built by Aristide Cavaille-Coll or Henry Willis rather than Arp Schnitger or Gottfried Silbermann, or because the trills are begun on the lower rather than the upper note.

One of the motives for putting on this Bach Marathon is to introduce some of the great and important Bach recordings of the past to an audience which is largely unfamiliar with them. Some of these recorded performances are among the greatest musical treasures which we possess. They are unforgivably neglected and rarely, if ever, broadcast. We cannot hope to do anything better than to share with you such rare and compelling records as Albert Spalding's concert performance of the Chaconne, Marcel Maas's 78's of the Toccota in C Minor, and Jennie Tourel's singing of "Erbarme Dich, mein Gott'' from the Saint Motthew Passion.

An obsession with the idea of hearing Bach's music performed on instruments which he knew has led to the inclusion of recordings of some of the organ works performed on three instruments which he is known to have played and on three others which he almost certainly played.

But that is but the beginning. Rosalyn Tureck will be here to talk about Bach and to share some of her rarest recordings with us. Igor Kipnis will introduce the recording of Jauchzet gott in ollen Landen he made with Eleanor Steber. William H. Scheide, the founder and Director of The Bach Aria Group will talk about the Cantatas and introduce the Bach Aria Group's recording of Am abend aber desselbigen Sabbats. The Rokeby Venus has prepared a daring expose of Wolfgang Schmieder (alias "BWV").

In selecting the records to be broadcast, the Laughing Cavalier has, with his usual facile perversity (perverse facility?) assembled a group of discs almost all of which are out of print.
